The thrill of the chase makes the challenge fun.

It's always seemed like a good idea to have my own little collection of OSFW stories. Unless people bring them to a meeting, how can we enjoy each other's stories?

The trick is to find issues. Where do you buy the latest issue of "Little Green Men"? Tracking down current issues takes the dedicated bibliophile to unlikely places. Oh, you're safe at Borders, or Barnes and Noble, but you might not want anyone to see you leave some others. Many sales, especially for people just breaking in, go to small press. The scary thought comes when you suspect copies to authors make up most of the circulation.

Back issues are trickier. Some members were kind enough to donate copies of their stories, while other stories led a merry chase.

A bibliography makes a good shopping list. Three B Bookstore on North Sheridan was a gold mine, thanks to its F&SF and HITCHCOCK's back issues. It takes

time to go through all the digest to find the right issues, but there was a faster way. Did the owners ever wonder what mysterious person organized all the HITCHCOCK'S from 1989 to 1995 by date? All it took to get a copy of Warren Brown's "The Last Waltz" from a 1984 OMNI was a visit to the library and enough dimes to feed the microfiche printer. A Sapulpa store ordered a hardback copy of RETURN TO THE TWILIGHT ZONE for K.D. Wentworth's story "Night of the Living Bra," and her "Outhouse Moon" came downloaded from the Internet. Borders had the last paperback copy of TIME OF THE VAMPIRES for Brad Sinor's "Oaths."

I look forward to B.J. Thrower's "Noodle Me, Noodle You" in ASIMOV'S. She will be the third OSFW author to make the magazine after Steve Kimmel's "Sweet Song of Death" in February, 1983, and five stories by R.A. Lafferty: "New People" in March, 1981; "You Can't Go Back," September, 1981; "Junkyard Thoughts," February, 1986; "Inventions Bright and New," May, 1986; and "Something Rich and Strange," July, 1986.

So far, my little collection includes three Warren Brown stories, one Brad Sinor, thirteen K.D. Wentworths, two Simon McCafferys, and one Steve Kimmel. They're in a shoe box under the bed. I take them out sometimes to gloat over them. Maybe one day I'll find another kid who wants to trade a really neat Alma Garcia for a couple of Greg Lowers.

Paul: Paul read Chapter Five of his novel-in-progress, ONCE ON HIGH, in which the People of the Lion are driven from their land by what they report are demons. "Enemies came in the hundreds and destroyed them in a single night. They are not men, so they treat men as beasts," even going so far as to eat them. I liked the sense of impending doom as this danger sweeps ever closer to Arkander's tribe, and Arkander's cleverness in preparing to meet them by learning as much as possible beforehand.

Warren: Warren brought us Chapter Eight, "Into the Night" (hurray!) of his novel-in-progress, UNDERLAND. After witnessing his in-laws' car

colliding with a logging truck, Jack tries to rescue them, and has to be rescued himself by the truck's driver, before it explodes. Later, only two body bags are loaded into the coroner's wagon and Jack has to deny his earlier statement that his (dead) wife was also in that car. I like the intriguing, ever-deepening mystery as Jack tries to delve into the series of impossible events that now comprise his life.

Rocky: Rocky read "Antimetheus," a short-short romp in the form of a letter to the editor on the subject of outlawing matches. After all, as he points out, "what would a law-abiding person want to do with making a fire?" He proposes banning open fire within five hundred feet of a dwelling, or school, and licensing matches in the same way guns are licensed. The convoluted path of logic is hilarious, and just a shade too close to some current crusades for comfort. I especially liked the signature—"One Who Loves Mankind."
