R.R. Bodine's epic SF novel of a future America, NIPTROPOLIS, is being considerd by Bantam.

Writer Jim Brunet recently choreographed a SFWA Ballet on Genie and it was so hilarious, we asked for permission to reproduce it here.

THE UNOFFICIAL SFWA BALLET

"From the wings enter two lines of dancers, moving towards the center: pas de chat, pas de chat, first arabesque, tour jette, first arabesque. [This suggests some of the backscratching that goes on with recommendations for the Nebula ballot.]

"Then enter five dancers--two from the left, three from the right--who come towards the center, each in a unique movement, one of the following: pique turns, glissade devant, pas de bourees, chinet turns, sautees. These dancers meet in the center and form a circle in which they rapidly step around on demi-pointe. Each dancer takes a turn stepping out of the circle center-stage to do an individual characteristic demi-solo. [This represents the Nebula Jury, composed of five individuals who each have strong ideas, opinions, and/or agendas and yet somehow add juried works to the final ballot. We take a bit of dramatic license by having only one jury on stage when in reality there are two, one for Novels, the other for Short Fiction.]

"We then have a lively pas de quatre representing the question of membership qualifications and who should be eligible to vote on the Nebulas

"Which is then followed by an exuberant peasant dance, performed in character shoes, of course, in front of sullen villagers. [This represents the campaign for a Dramatic Nebula.]

"A cannon from the Nutcracker is wheeled onstage and fired; this represents various letters to the FORUM on the subject of the Dramatic Nebula.

"A soloist then comes leaping on stage in a series of grand jettes that segue into jettes tournant. The dancer stops and dies on stage in mid-step. This is meant to be a comic allusion to a certain SFWA officer. Another dancer then comes on stage and finishes out the string of jettes before exiting the stage.

"The backscratchers come out on stage for a reprise of their earlier movement; an anguished soloist comes on stage and does eloquent Carabosse-like pirouettes culminating with a shaking fist and Carabosse's 'death!' mime cribbed from THE SLEEPING BEAUTY. [Cribbing is an honored tradition in ballet choreography. Sort of. If you don't get caught.]

"We follow this with an unusual series of four pas de cinqs, each representing the five finalists in four categories. Each pas de cinq is probably a variation on the same theme. I'm not sure of the music yet, but it's called 'It's an Honor Just to Be Nominated.' Except that one or two dancers in pas de cinq break out of formation to do some extravagant fouettes. Again, work with me here, but I think that while the Novel dancing is probably the most attention-getting, the Novella dances are probably the most technically demanding.

"For the Finale, the entire cast comes out on stage. The four Winners are downstage center, striking vibrant arabesque poses as the rest of the cast mills around them. Milling a balletic sort of way, of course.

"The curtain falls.

"And they said it couldn't be done."


