*** THE ICE PICK ***

THE MARSHALL PLAN FOR NOVEL WRITING by Evan Marshall. Cincinnati: Writer's Digest Books. ISBN 0-89879-848-5. \$17.99

If you have always wanted to take a novel-writing course, this book may be for you. Using this "16-step program guaranteed to take you from idea to completed manuscript," by the noted literary agent, editor, and novelist, Evan Marshall, is like taking a course. A tough course. But a very good one.

In a methodical and practical way, Marshall lays out how to approach, plan, outline, plot, write, finish, and submit a novel. Intended to help authors who haven't started a novel yet, it can be very helpful to those of us with half-finished books or a file drawer full of rejected manuscripts, as well.

Part of the fun of reading, studying, or using a how-to-write book is arguing with the author, because every one of them has a pet peeve or two and will tell you to do different things. For example, Marshall recommends against using a character name ending in "s," and he doesn't like novels where the antagonist is inanimate. Most surprising to me is his attitude toward viewpoint. The normal "rule" is to stick to one point of view in writing your novel or at least to change chapters when you change viewpoint characters. Marshall ignores this "rule" and gives a wonderful explanation of how best to structure a multiple point-of-view novel.

You might want to skim the book before settling

down to use it in constructing a novel or finishing one in progress, so you have an idea of what is coming up and avoid worrying about something covered in a later step.

The book is clearly written, nicely laid-out, and has an excellent index. It is filled with practical advice, such as Marshall's recommendation to use mailing envelopes that are padded with plastic rather than pulped paper when submitting your manuscript (to avoid showering the agent or editor's office with confetti if the envelope bursts!).

I recommend it highly for aspiring novelists.
