January 1995 or Night of the Living Novel Excerpts

Elspeth hosted the January meeting, with the help of the Amazing Manx That Eats Queso. About 15 members attended, and by some unexplainable temporal hiccup, everyone was able to read. There was a tasty array of snacks, and Ben, who has been away in Iowa enjoying his freshman year at Grinnell, was able to attend.

Rocky read "Envy," the journal of a dead master pianist who recounts his all-consuming rivalry with a lesser-talented but more popular musician. While the protagonist harnesses new technology that accesses the human neural net to create a new level of perfect concert experiences, the other pianist plays to small audiences only, and takes extraordinary measures to make sure no one records a single performance. Because memory is subjective, the rival's small, non-electronic performances eventually gain worldwide fame.

I enjoyed the tale's ironic ending, and except for a scene that might have been inserted earlier in the narrative, thought this was a strong story.

Elspeth read the first chapter of her sf novel in progress, which shares the post-apocalypse world and characters first created in "The Gerbil God" (remember "plumpkin"?). With the help of a flock of robotic hover cams, Cadence sets out on her first story assignment "outside" the sealed cities into the outlying wastelands. Media hounds of the future are as unlikable as their present-day counterparts, but I enjoyed all of the technical details,

and the scene with the little girl at the settler's oasis.

Paul read three brief opening scenes from his sf novel-in-progress, *This Thing of Darkness*. Top genetic scientist Dr. Stadler (sp?) has been held for over a year in an underground lab where a terrifying, humanoid killing machine is being created. Fearful of what Stadler's abilities might unleash in the "wrong" hands, a warring bunch of scientists prepare to mount a raid on the underground lab, with orders to kill Stadler. A good start to a techno-thriller.

Warren read Chapter Two, "Driving North," from his novel-in-progress, *Underland*. Proving once again that he's the undisputed king of character development in OSFW, Warren took us inside the thoughts of Jack as he drives from Moon Pier to visit his late wife's parents (who claim they have seen Pamela alive). I enjoyed the scene in which Jack passes by his old high school and feels a brush with the past, the near-miss with the deer, "Zilwaukee," and the dish towels.

Fran sang a rhyming ode to single mothers that included an unusual parallel to the events surrounding the birth of Christ in Bethlehem.

Ben read Greg's short story, "Pictures at a Con Show," an alternate Peter Pan story in which Hook is dead and Peter now captains a shipful of pirates. The year is 1911, and Peter and his crew successfully detain and board a steamer captained by none other than J. M. Barrie, the creator of Peter Pan.
