Thirteen attended the first meeting of the new year. Several welcome new faces were present and Elspeth's cat was especially entertaining. A number of interesting topics were discussed, including the misinformed neighbor who dropped in to inform us that someone was parking in HIS spot, even thought the apartment building does not assign parking slots. The mood of the evening's fiction was a bit on the steamy side, but we bucked up and read it all.

Barbara read Chapter Ten of All the Warriors in Pell, written from the viewpoint of terrorist Ger Finn. I liked the flashbacks of his boyhood which clarify the manner in which his mother taught him the terrible price of loving in this world, ultimately creating the hollow violent man he is today, unable to love anyone, or anything, most especially himself.

Paul read the beginning fragment of "The Kingdom of Flowers," a first person account of meeting Dracula. Most of the piece was cast in the form of a conversation, which concealed far more than it revealed. As usual, I was swept away by Paul's prose ("The cast of his eyes was distant, but still they drank the light"), which was lyrical, while not losing clarity. I hope he finishes this soon!

Rocky read another segment of his story in which Buzz, Jason, and Harold are stuck in another character's book. I loved their dilemma as they try to figure out how to escape. Their solutions alternately include refusing to worship the author, flattering him, and fooling him by pretending the book is the Truth of the Ages. In the end, they decide they can do anything they want because it is only a book. It was, put quite simply, hilarious.

Elspeth brought the first section of a story about a broadcaster in the near future, Cadence Bartholomew. I liked the carefully built up picture of what broadcasting might be like in that future and also the interpersonal dynamics at play.

As long as the works are not in print, or did not receive professional level pay, you are still eligible.

There is no entry fee. You may enter only one story per quarter. Length must be under 17,000 words. Each entry must have a cover page with the title of the work, the author's name, address, and telephone number, and an approximate word count. The manuscript must be titled and numbered on each page, but the author's name must not appear on the actual manuscript. Include a SASE for the return of your manuscript. Entries are judged by a panel of professional writers which varies from quarter to quarter.

The next three quarterly deadlines are March 31st, June 30th, and September 30th. Three cash prizes are awarded each quarter, \$1,000, \$750, and \$500. An additional prize of \$4,000 will be awarded to the Grand Prize Winner for the year, selected from the four first place winners. All winners receive a trip to the awards ceremony and a workshop with Contest Editor Dave Wolverton. Writers are also paid an additional amount for the right to print the winning manuscripts in a mass market anthology.
