## \*\*\* I AM A GOOD REJECTION, ALAS, ALAS \*\*\*

I am a good rejection, alas, alas. And I am still a pain in the ass, in the ass ... Aw, 'nuff dat poetry!

Writers, are U confused about what, exactly, a good rejection is? Especially to beginning writers, a good rejection is significant, and to a certain degree, helps you gauge how much progress you're making. Good rejections are, well, as good as it gets in Rejection Land. You've connected with the editor. She/he read all, or part of your story. Penny can't vouch for the contents, as she's received both encouraging, polite, professional rejections with tactful pointers, and incredibly stupid and rude "good" rejections from editors who waste their time and yours by being overly-critical or downright pompous. The famous OSFW ritual question, "DID ANYONE GET ANY GOOD REJECTIONS?" refers to A & B below:

A good rejection is:

A. A letter addressed to you personally, closing with the editor's signature. Its contents may be brief (or not), but some aspect of your story is discussed, even if your story is referred to as "it." as in, "It's not what I'm looking for." It's usually typed by the editor him/herself.

B. A checklist with additional comments written on the page, which may not necessarily be signed by the editor. Still, it's a personalized acknowledgment that your story was duly considered.

Anything else just isn't a good rejection. There may be other form rejections Penny doesn't know about, but she does know that even successful writers still receive them occasionally.

A good rejection isn't:

C. A form letter that begins with "Dear Contributor/ Author" or anything similar. It ends with "The Editors," or same. It looks photocopied because it is a photocopy.

D. Checklists with only check marks.

E. There's what Penny calls a "personalized form letter," which has your name typed or written at the top, which may or may not be signed by the editor. It contains no story details, and is a photocopy too.

— If you've received a rejection that doesn't fit any of the above categories. Penny would like to see it. She hopes this was helpful, and didn't insult your intelligence, but that's OK because Penny is, gosh darn it. Proseworthy.

(Note from Angela McCaffery: If you receive a rejection that includes the words, DO SEND YOUR NEXT, you may assume it is from Kristine Kathryn Rusch!

If you receive a rejection with smudged bits of Ding Dongs or Little Debbie® HoHos on it, you may assume it is from Gardner Dozois, a.k.a. Twinkiehead.
