Thirteen people attended the June meeting at Warren's and Lana's spacious new house on Tulsa's south side. A special note of thanks to Chris Merle, who brought color and b&w copies of the OSFW Home page, along with bios/bibliographies of OSFW published members. Though Chris later recruited Greg to play photographer, and then forced these same members to pose for pictures to be included with their bios, we took it like men, or, er, women, we heard genre fiction too, and unanimously agreed that every male character in each story/chapter was a

"great LOVer." Hey, if you keep reading you'll get it

Still in her "mineral phase," Kathy read a fantasy short story, "Green as Malachite, His Eyes." Andi, a girl of Cherokee ancestry, is allowed to visit her grandparents alone for the first time, and discovers that her need to know even the worst facts about the Trail of Tears will determine how complete a person she will be for the rest of her life. I liked the grandparents' struggle not to tell Andi against her mother's wishes, the cool-green malachite place where her grandpa flees the modern world to join the mineral bears, and the nice detailing of Cherokee traditions, such as weaving baskets from honeysuckle vine.

Paul brought Chapter Two of his "million word" <eek!> fantasy epic, ONCE ON HIGH. Four Mongolesque chieftains squabble over who inherits the spear of Zhakorzha. In the meantime, 12-year-old Arkandr is treated not only to the sight of his cousin K'Kar raping the comely servant girl Ljan, but to a near-deadly confrontation with his repugnant cousin afterwards. I liked the dialogue of the chieftains as they scorn each other: "little twig-bender!" "rutting bull!"; the utter smoothness of the prose; and that the evening's biggest laugh was generated when the rapist K'Kar brags to Arkandr, "I am a great LOVer."

Ja-Lene (Jenks) Clark made her reading debut with a short novel chapter from TRAVELING COMPAN-IONS, in which forty-year-old Anna Bailey is lying on her death bed surrounded by her anxious family. When she passes away, she meets a woman who will be her guide in that ol' tunnel of light, plus the infinite aspects of her own soul. I liked the hope that this chapter suggests, that even in death a person lives has tasks to perform.

Still in her "vampire phase," Barbara read df novelette, "The Call." When the people of the earth are exterminated as a result of a meteor impact, who remains? The denizens of the supernatural, who are on a collision course to their own special apocalypse, as seen/experienced from the viewpoint of anti-hero vampire, Vincent.


