*** CONTINUUM *** By Simon McCaffery

A good-sized crowd of about 16 gathered at K.D. and Richard's humble home to hear an interesting mix of stories and chapters. There were plenty of Little Debbies and other fattening treats, and no one seemed to mind it when Sammie began working on the patio doors with a glass cutter.

Rocky started the evening off with a chapter and several funny excerpts from his novel-in-progress, Raccoon's Law. Mankind and the known universe are an unimaginably advanced VR program designed and set in motion by Rocky's teenage hero, who discovers his program has been infected with "technology, paradoxes, puns and cheap dialog." The young hero and a sharptongued AI jump from timeline to timeline, encountering some really strange characters (including the memorable, Hobbitlike cowboy Billybob Boggins) while gauging the extent of the distortion. Things really get out of hand when Billybob steps into the hero's ship -- something he naturally shouldn't be able to do.

I enjoyed the Lafferty-like pace and style of the chapter, and the freewheeling fun of the dialog excerpts.

K.D. gave Fran a chance to the her skills as a storyteller by asking her to read a new short story, "Her Fair and Unpolluted Flesh." In this alternate history tale -- in which Shakespearean-based scripture drives the church -- two priests are dispatched to root out blasphemy at a convent. I enjoyed the scenes in which Father Frederick is haunted by memories of his drowned sister, and the details of the Blessed Immersion ceremony.

Chris O. read "Something To Come Home To," the funny tale of Bernice, who works as an appliance psychiatrist and endures constant heckling from a friend's gardenias. I enjoyed the sulking microwave and Bernice's clever plan to dispose of the nasty talking flowers.

Paul took a break from "Monkey" to read "The Moon's White Kiss," a powerful, lyrical tale of a man who discovers his teenage daughter is a ghoul who escapes from the house by night to visit graveyards in search of decayed flesh. Needless to

Simon read a protogue of sorts to his novel-inprogress, Counterpane. Ethan Mullins, an 11year-old leukemia patient, wakes to the smell of fresh-cut grass in his gloomy hospice room and is given a strange invitation to visit a sunnier place.

Sukie: Sounds like "lucky break."

Herbert: Oh, yeah. Why didn't I think of that?

Sukie: No comment. Actually I had considered doing a movie review, but then I thought of the popcorn and what all that second-hand coconut oil would do to my arteries.

Herbert: You mean they pop the corn in suntan lotion?

Sukie: All I know is the newest public health study reports a small popcorn has "more fat than a bacon-andeggs breakfast, a Big Mac-with-fries lunch and a steak dinner...combined."

Herbert: Ugh! I'll stick with the LITE while you do the reviews. What do you have?

Sukie: A new small press magazine that came out in Fall, 1993:

It is subtitled "A Collection of Fiction and Poetry for a New Age" and the guidelines for this West Coast publication are awe-inspiring:

"...short fiction and poetry of spirituality... awakenings, deeper understanding.

"...competent writing with strong plots...memorable major characters, and dynamic, tight dialogue.

"Theme ideas: kindness, acceptance, compassion, cooperation, sharing, mediation, giving and receiving, unconditional love, freedom, wisdom, spiritual growth, world peace, peace of mind, generosity, oneness, meditation, creative expression, mindfulness, honesty, self discovery, contemplation, well-being, simplicity.

"Metaphysics...life after death. SF/F Elements: Space travel, time travel, future civilizations, extraterrestrials, technology...robotics...superhuman powers, ancient civilizations, imagination, hallucinations, denying laws of physics, inanimate objects coming to life...unicoms, dragons, fairies, elves, ghosts, etc."

And that's just scratching the surface. It goes on and on. Nothing wrong with any of it, of course, but it certainly would have been simpler to list what was not wanted. In the end, I was so flummoxed I just submitted—

Herbert: Hold it, hold it! YOU submitted?

Sukie: Yes, given those wonderful guidelines, I believed my story might have fitted in somewhere beneath that umbrella of classifications. It did not, but the six stories (by women writers) chosen for the premiere issue are entertaining, and don't contain the sweltering, steamy horror that abounds in so many of the small-press magazines.

"The Right Wish" (Linda Healy) is about a very odd Santa Claus, who nevertheless manages to give a woman, disillusioned with marriage, what she didn't know she wanted. "Surprise!" (Jan Von Tobel) deals with a sex-machine salesman in a world where normal sex first became too dangerous and, later, was outmoded.

Herbert: What's that? Normal sex outmoded?

Sukie: Pipe down, Herbert! I'm not touching this one with a ten-foot pole. I'd like to know which of the above classifications it belongs in though. It may not be horror, but it sure swelters and steams. If anyone wants to find out more, they'll have to beg for a back issue.

Herbert: Can I borrow that?

Sukie: No, get a LITE. "Whiteflight" by Diane Moomey is a new look at road-kill; it says a lot in very few words.

Juanita Nelson's "Zedna" portrays an afterlife where people develop mentally, morally, and physically with the help of a very kind and articulate Guide.

In "After the Moonies," Judith Beth Cohen reveals little details about different religions as seen through the eyes of Babs, the unconventional, ever-hopeful narrator.

Carole Bellacera's "Aura" won Second Place Honorable Mention in the 1993 Andre Norton Award. A man, after being struck by lightning, develops odd, psychic powers which ultimately enable him to save his daughter's life.

This is a very nice first issue, well-presented, and blessedly free of typos. Layout, design, typesetting and printing by A E Press, Concord, California.

Herbert: How are you going to rate it?


Sukie: Twelve beer-bottle caps.
