Eleven little ghouls gathered at Guido and Karen's home to marvel at Sammy Samurai Two Socks' new hair. Paul made use of Uncle Guido's KINKOs service, there were heated discussions regarding Bantam's greedy decision to strip "Star Wars" authors of 2-percent royalties, and we enjoyed four readings, especially Paul's battle scenes, to the wet popping sound-effects supplied as Sammy demolished another rawhide chewie. "Arkander spun in the saddle and thrust his spear at the oncoming Urjuk, splitting the fiend's breastplate (POP! SMACK!), the tip cleaving his breastbone (SNAP! SLURP!) as if it were brittle wood (CRUUUNNCH! SMACK!!)..."

Michael W.: Michael made his OSFW debut with "Village God," and the tale of young K'tamo, an inquisitive boy who discovers that the god protecting their village is a vampire. Following the village priest and his father one evening to the demon's cave, K'tamo watches in horror as his father undergoes "communing" with the blood-hungry ghoul. K'tamo keeps his silence, but spends the remainder of his childhood preparing himself for the inevitable confrontation. When he reaches manhood the day arrives when the priest announces that it his turn to commune with their god. K'tamo stabs the priest and impales the vampire with a wooden spear. I enjoyed the scene in which the expiring vampire attempts to defend his actions, and K'tamo's resolve to hunt other vampires.

Paul: Paul read chapter 7 of his "bloated epic," Once On High. Arkander and his clan prepare to do battle with thousands of Urjuk. The warriors assemble and head out, riding until they come upon their enemy crossing a river. After debating the situation, they separate to attack the Urjuk mass from the north, south and center, and break it into splinters. But the lead group is forced to engage the enemy early, and the middle force charges too soon. In an effort to save them, Arkander convinces the others to allow him to lead 300 archers as a diversion. Firing missiles into the Urjuk before quickly retreating, Arkander and his small band are successful. Eventually, however, they run out of arrows and their horses tire, and they are forced to retreat. Despite a heroic effort, Arkander and his people must flee from the overwhelm-

ing Urjuk, abandoning their lands and fleeing ever south. As always, the chapter was vivid and well-paced. Paul skillfully kept us on the edges of our seat by cutting to and from each character and scene.

Brad: Brad read "Everything and Nothing," a story set in the universe of the comic and film character "The Crow." The Crow visits a bonsai gardener named Gideon, who once barely escaped a savage death at the hands of bikers. The Crow shows Gideon a vision of what would have happened to he and his wife, had a figure not inadvertently directed them to an alley and escape from the pursuing hand of cutthroats. Gideon agrees to help The Crow in repayment, and is told to take a ride on his motorcycle. He finds himself at a biker bar, and manges to rescue an underage stripper named Bambi. The ungrateful (and scantily clad) Bambi proceeds to bean Gideon with a rusty pipe and rides off on his bike. Gideon staggers into the street, and sees himself and wife flash by in his Mustang. Thus we find out that Gideon was the mysterious figure who saved them from the bikers. Caw!

K.D.: Kathy read "Bad Company," in which a cop named Tulley comes upon the body of one of the "Folk" while walking his beat near a park. In this alternate reality humans have definite rules about dealing with the elves that sometime share their world, and Tulley ignores the body, keeping with the law that the folk handle their own disputes and killings. Soon he is confronted with a sleek. pale, green luminescent creature named Brelia. This sheelf implores him to assist her to find landir's killer (the dead elf) before The Kindling. To his horror, Tulley eventually realizes that he killed the elf, and accidentally received something the other elves want as part of hunting sport with the human. A subsequent transformation separates his spirit so he is doomed to haunt the Folks' lands and lead them on hunts, while his soulless shell returns to his wife and family. I enjoyed the great, creepy descriptions of the Folk, and the moody, supernatural atmosphere of the park.

*** THE ICE PICK ***

Elwood, Maren. Characters Make Your Story. Boston, The Writer. ISBN 0-87116-019-6. \$14.94.

"It is characters that sell stories," says Maren Elwood.

One of the major criticisms of science fiction/fantasy/horror is of the flat characters that so often people these genres. If the reader doesn't care what happens to Capt. Snarf or Sir Barf, all the wonderful plotting in this, or any other, world won't help. Look at the popularity of Star Trek and Star Wars. The science may have been bad, but the characters were lovable and reached far beyond sf/f/h fandom to touch people's lives. Can you write accurate sf/f/h background/plots and lovable characters to cheer for and weep with? If you can, maybe you can write a best seller.

Do you sometimes fall in love with a character and wonder how you could "steal" the author's technique to make readers fall in love with your characters? Maren shows you how to do that with solid, practical advice on how to actually make your characters (and your story) come alive.

When do you tell about a character and when do you show? Separate chapters explain creating your characters by physical appearance, by walk and gesture, through facial expression and glance, by their voice and manner of speech, using dialogue, using their thoughts, and by their action.

Do you have difficulty <u>showing</u> motivation, individualizing minor characters, or making your readers feel a certain emotion? Further chapters show how to develop your characters' motivation, how to handle simple and complex characterization, and how to use contrast in setting and description to bring your characters to life.

And of special interest to those who write fan fiction is a chapter on how you can develop plot from your characters. Other chapters deal with certain common problems of characterization in the short-short story, film, or novel, and in juvenile versus adult stories.

Maren also discusses the taboos in writing. Some look pretty silly to us now, but ask yourself what taboos we have right now and what new ones may exist in a few years that will make today's look just as offensive.

As a bonus, in the back of the book are five short stories, analyzed so you can see how different techniques are applied. Given the short print life of most how-to-write books, any one still in print after fifty-five years deserves some special attention.
